



March Comment: After the wettest winter on record, this month was pretty well back to average for rain. Indeed, after a soaking right at the beginning of the month we were all surprised and delighted by a 16 day period spanning the middle of the month with no rain at all. This compares rather favourably with the fact that between 12 December 2013 and the start of March there were only 5 days with no measurable rain. Mild temperatures continued giving us hope for

the year ahead and plenty of early spring blossom with daffs and crocuses in abundance.

DURWESTON CE VA PRIMARY SCHOOL

The children have been marching out on their latest Welly Walk. In a plethora of plain, flowered, stripy, spotty and Peppa Pig wellies, the children rambled through the amazing countryside that we are so fortunate to have surrounding us. Whilst the younger members of the school and Handy Paws, (plus their even younger siblings snuggled into carriers) stretched their legs in an energetic walk closer to school, the older children went on a slightly more challenging trip to Norton wood and Bonsley Common, with the added bonus of meeting one of George's giant tractors! Mrs Santer, with her knowledge of the local area, competently planned the two routes for the children and invited members of the wider school community to participate also. There were even some well-behaved dogs who attended the KS2 walk. In response to last terms enquiry about the importance of the church to Durweston, one of our pupils, Freya, wrote an eloquent piece which we think deserves printing and many would enjoy.

If it was not there, the carol service and the nativity wouldn't be the same, although hot wax on your fingers isn't an experience I am likely to forget any day soon. There wouldn't be trips to the church, me staring absent-mindedly at the stained glass windows wondering who on earth these people were. There also wouldn't be assemblies there, although

the fact spiders are resident there does put me off slightly. We wouldn't have these lessons and we wouldn't have our accounts of the church. Much of Durweston's history wouldn't exist. Durweston revolves around the church. I know it means a lot to other people. The kneelers are sewed with love, the visitor book shows that people do come to look at the church and all that it has to offer. People choose to spend their after-life here. Without the church, this school most likely wouldn't be here and then I and everyone else would have a second-class childhood.

I want to look back fondly at this school and church as a sweet, little village that, though I didn't know it, actually meant quite a bit to me. So I will revise my first sentence and say: Durweston church does mean a lot to me, though I was ignorant of that fact. And hopefully it means a lot to my fellow beings." Freya.

We are all looking forward to a very busy Summer Term which will include our annual residential visits for Years 4 and 6 to Leeson House and to the Isle of Wight, Sports Day and our Leavers Service at the end of term. The children will soon be starting rehearsals for the summer performances which also take place in July. It was inspired by the children's work which was taking place in every class around our school and I felt very passionately that it should be shared within the local community. I do hope too that it gives an informative insight as to what the children have been learning about through our cross-curricular topics.

Maple Class - Reception

Building on teamwork and communication, language and story-telling creativity, the children have amazed us with their ingenuity, within construction and role play. Their use of 'Poddely' this term has increased their awareness of each other, of using materials safely and managing small risks in addition to it's creative purposes.

We have been very busy counting this term! Counting in tens and twos, learning about odd and even numbers. The children found any opportunity to pair things up – even the frogs went two by two (see below)! Some children have been beginning to estimate numbers and then check them, whilst others have enjoyed recording totals.

All in all, a very successful and enjoyable term. Our superheroes have left us suspended in space, and our learning has been out of this world! The children are currently evaluating their learning and making suggestions for our next term's themes! We can't wait!

Chestnut Class - Year 1

"I have liked learning about the Rainforest, making our mobile masks and recording the information in a fact file this term."

"In my group I have liked the new sounds that I have used in my writing."

"Making the bath bombs in Science was good. The colour changed when we added food colouring and they fizzed."

Cherry Class – Year 2

"We enjoyed learning where different places are in the United Kingdom"

"We used wire, a light bulb and a cell to investigate electricity in science"

"We have been investigating multiplication and found out that using apparatus and shapes help you with your times tables"

Willow Class - Year 3

"Everyone in Year 3 has enjoyed the Egyptians, especially the homework project where there were plenty of ideas to show Howard Carter finding Tutankhamen's treasures."

"We all liked learning about Egyptians and had a great Egyptian day."

Silver Birch Class - Year 4

This term has been really fun because I have enjoyed learning about the Himalayas. I also learnt a lot about climbing and it was fun. I learnt how to put on a harness and the equipment that was needed when you climb mountains. Our class all went climbing at The Blandford School. We all thought that the school was big compared to our one. The climbing wall was 24 feet high and I managed to climb half of that. It was really scary as well because we had to put our toes into little gaps and there were not any big bricks to hold onto.

This term we have been learning about MIGHTY MOUNTAINS! I really enjoyed the climbing; it was fun because it is all about confidence and also about believing in you.

I enjoyed learning about how some Indian people have to carry bowls for long walks to find water and then take it back to their home or village. Sometimes they even have to go down and back up a mountain.

"I was amazed by our penguin learning and their habitats this term."

Sycamore Class - Year 6

We have been busy looking after our eggs and have looked forward to caring for our chicks once the eggs hatched. Below is an extract from one of our chick diaries.

In the egg! - The first day we got the eggs everyone was very excited. As the days went by and the eggs developed, we started to get more and more curious as the days went by. In the first 5- 10 days we candled them (putting a very bright light under the egg to see inside) to find out if a living creature was inside. The last time we candled them was day 14 and there was hopefully a fully formed chick inside the egg, but not everyone was so lucky...

Hatching Days 1-2 and 3 – The first chick to hatch was Chunk (Jess's) followed by: Guppy, Pick, Snider, Eggward, Chickpea, Bobo, Jimmy, Yolky, Tikka, Chicken Little and Paraddidle. Unfortunately only 12 hatched the other 12 were not so fortunate to make hatching day.

Chickhood in the cage – Mr and Mrs Emmet have helped us out to care for our chicks, such as: putting bedding down, fresh food and water, transporting them from the incubator to the cage and generally making sure they are safe and sound.

Growing Up! – Since hatching day we have been very proud chick parents. We have watched them grow and gain confidence around us and their siblings. They have lost most of their fluffy feathers and have started to develop their plumage (adult feathers).

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
INVESTOR IN PEOPLE

Free and confidential information service for the over 50's

Anne Wilkins and Phyllis Watt are Wayfinders who provide this support to anyone over 50 in the local area. We do this as part of the Dorset Partnership for Older People's Programme (POPP).

We provide information to individuals or friends and family who need a helping hand to find out about the services and support available. We always try and find an answer, whatever the question. Our POPP team have a large list of contacts and information on a variety of topics, including: Fire Service home safety checks, health services, carers support, home aids, home care, social activities, food, transport and benefits. If asked for help, we can arrange to visit you at your home and listen to your needs and discuss any concerns you have.

Never imagine that your query is too complex or too small. There are so many services in Dorset, we may be able to tell you about one that you were not aware of and many are free of charge. We don't know everything, but if you ask us something we will make every effort to get the information you need.



Dorset POPP also provide Champions to help the over 50's. Champions support the development of clubs and services in partnership with local communities. When Wayfinders find a gap in the provision of a service, they will inform a POPP Champion to see if they can help. Funding is currently available to support new initiatives for the over 50s. Dorset POPP has funded over 200 projects, from lunch clubs to activities for carers.


